




NGO responsibility

- Petition to save the Baltic porpoise – meeting with the EU Commissioner next week






NGO influence


2019 – NGOs ask EC for emergency measures

2020 – ICES publishes scientific advice

2020-21 – BALTFISH negotiates joint recommendations

2022 – delegated act under the CFP






NGO influence

- 2019 NGO formal complaint about cetacean bycatch in EU waters
- 2020 the EU Commission opens an infringement procedure against Sweden for not complying with some articles of the EU Habitats Directive in relation to bycatch of harbour porpoises

(also Spain and France on common dolphin bycatch)





We are not done yet!

- Bycatch needs to be mitigated in the entire population range
- Current focus is on how to do that
- Other threats also need to be mitigated
- New large-scale survey needed
 - SAMBAH II
